
- 1. Normal understanding the words of Scripture in their common usage unless otherwise indicated by the context.
- 2. Literal understanding the meaning of Scripture in its ordinary sense unless the context requires a figurative interpretation.
- 3. Grammatical using the recognized rules of grammar to interpret the text.
- 4. Historical understanding the words of Scripture in the context of the times in which they were written.
- 5. Systematic categorizing and comparing the teaching of the Scriptures with the whole of Scripture in view.


#### Hezekiah Shows His Treasures

<sup>1a</sup>At that time Merodach-baladan son of Baladan, king of Babylon, sent letters and a present to Hezekiah, for he heard that he had been sick and had recovered. <sup>2</sup>Hezekiah <sup>1</sup>was <sup>a</sup>pleased, and showed them *all* his treasure house, the <sup>b</sup>silver and the gold and the spices and the precious oil and his whole armory and all that was found in his treasuries. There was nothing in his house nor in all his dominion that Hezekiah did not show them. <sup>3</sup> Then Isaiah the <sup>a</sup>prophet came to King Hezekiah and said to him, "What did these men say, and from where have they come to you?" And Hezekiah said, "They have come to me from a far <sup>b</sup>country, from Babylon." <sup>4</sup>He said, "What have they seen in your house?" So Hezekiah <sup>1</sup>answered, "They have seen all that is in my house; there is nothing among my treasuries that I have not shown them."

<sup>5</sup>Then Isaiah said to Hezekiah, "Hear the <sup>a</sup>word of the LORD of hosts, <sup>6</sup> 'Behold, the days are coming when <sup>a</sup>all that is in your house and all that your fathers have laid up in store to this day will be carried to Babylon; nothing will be left,' says the LORD. <sup>7</sup> 'And some of your sons who will issue from you, whom you will beget, <sup>a</sup>will be taken away, and <sup>b</sup>they will become officials in the palace of the king of Babylon.' <sup>8</sup> <sup>a</sup>Then Hezekiah said to Isaiah, "The word of the LORD which you have spoken is good." 
# Discussion and Application

  - v10 A voice saying to the cities of Judah (3rd person)




