### The Passover: Instructions to Moses

<sup>1</sup> The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt,

<sup>2</sup> "This month shall be for you the beginning of months. It shall be the first month of the year for you. [Beginning the Marking of Time for the Children of Israel]

<sup>3</sup> Tell all the congregation of Israel that on the tenth day of this month every man shall take a lamb according to their fathers' houses, a lamb for a household. [The Lamb Selected]

<sup>4</sup> And if the household is too small for a lamb, then he and his nearest neighbor shall take according to the number of persons; according to what each can eat you shall make your count for the lamb. [All Included]

<sup>5</sup> Your lamb shall be without blemish, a male a year old. You may take it from the sheep or from the goats, [Without Blemish]

<sup>6</sup> and you shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month, when the whole assembly of the congregation of Israel shall kill their lambs at twilight. [Slain]





### The Passover: Instructions to Moses

<sup>7</sup> "Then they shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. [The Blood Shed and Spread]

<sup>8</sup> They shall eat the flesh that night, roasted on the fire; with unleavened bread and bitter herbs they shall eat it. [The Passover Feast]

<sup>9</sup> Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted, its head with its legs and its inner parts.

<sup>10</sup> And you shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn.


<sup>11</sup> [In this manner you shall eat it:] with your belt fastened, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand. And you shall eat it in haste. It is the LORD's Passover.

<sup>12</sup> For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike all the firstborn in the land of Egypt, both man and beast; <u>and on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments</u>: I am the LORD.

<sup>13</sup> The blood shall be a sign for you, on the houses where you are. And when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague will befall you to destroy you, when I strike the land of Egypt. [JUDGMENT of a NATION]







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

### **Instructions Concerning the Passover**

- Required a perpetual remembrance – the beginning of the Jewish calendar
- Required a sacrifice an unblemished lamb to be sacrificed
- Required a sign blood placed on the doorposts and lintels
- Required a meal roasted lamb
- Required readiness for departure belted, sandals on feet, staff







## The Feast of Unleavened Bread

<sup>14</sup> "This day shall be for you a memorial day, and you shall keep it as a feast to the LORD; throughout your generations, as a statute forever, you shall keep it as a feast.

<sup>15</sup> Seven days you shall eat unleavened bread. On the first day you shall remove leaven out of your houses, for if anyone eats what is leavened, from the first day until the seventh day, that person shall be cut off from Israel.

<sup>16</sup> On <u>the first day you shall hold a holy assembly</u>, and on <u>the seventh day a holy assembly</u>. No work shall be done on those days. But what everyone needs to eat, that alone may be prepared by you.

<sup>17</sup> And you shall observe the Feast of Unleavened Bread, for on this very day I brought your hosts out of the land of Egypt. Therefore you shall observe this day, throughout your generations, as a statute forever.

<sup>18</sup> In the first month, from the fourteenth day of the month at evening, you shall eat unleavened bread until the twenty-first day of the month at evening.

<sup>19</sup> For seven days no leaven is to be found in your houses. If anyone eats what is leavened, that person will be cut off from the congregation of Israel, whether he is a sojourner or a native of the land.

<sup>20</sup> You shall eat nothing leavened; in all your dwelling places you shall eat unleavened bread."

• Required as a Memorial Feast and

#### **A Perpetual Remembrance**

- Required the Removal of Leaven from Houses
- Required Two Holy Assemblies (1<sup>st</sup> & 7<sup>th</sup> Days)
- Required the No Work to Be Done
- Focus: "The Day I Brought You Out!"

### The 1<sup>st</sup> Passover Celebration: Moses Instructs the People

<sup>21</sup> Then Moses called all the elders of Israel and said to them, "Go and select lambs for yourselves according to your clans, and kill the Passover lamb.

<sup>22</sup> Take a bunch of hyssop and dip it in the blood that is in the basin, and **touch the lintel and the two doorposts with the blood that is in the basin**. None of you shall go out of the door of his house until the morning.

<sup>23</sup> For the LORD will pass through to strike the Egyptians, and when he sees the blood on the lintel and on the two doorposts, the LORD will pass over the door and will not allow the destroyer to enter your houses to strike you.

<sup>24</sup> You shall observe this rite as a statute for you and for your sons forever.

<sup>25</sup> And when you come to the land that the LORD will give you, as he has promised, you shall keep this service. <sup>26</sup> And when your children say to you, 'What do you mean by this service?'

<sup>27</sup> you shall say, 'It is the sacrifice of the LORD's Passover, for he passed over the houses of the people of Israel in Egypt, when he struck the Egyptians but spared our houses.'" And the people bowed their heads and worshiped. (see Exodus 4:31)

<sup>28</sup> Then the people of Israel went and did so; as the LORD had commanded Moses and Aaron, so they did.





### **Instructions to the People**

- Select and Kill the Lamb
- Dip Hyssop in the Blood and Touch the Doorposts and Lintel
- Remain Inside Your Homes Until Morning
- The Lord will Preserve You
- The Destroyer Will Strike the Egyptians
- This Feast is to Be Kept Even in the Land





### The 10th Plague: The Death of the Firstborn

<sup>29</sup> At midnight the LORD struck down all the firstborn in the land of Egypt, from the firstborn of Pharaoh who sat on his throne to the firstborn of the captive who was in the dungeon, and all the firstborn of the livestock.

<sup>30</sup> And Pharaoh rose up in the night, he and all his servants and all the Egyptians. And there was a great cry in Egypt, for there was not a house where someone was not dead.

<sup>31</sup> Then he summoned Moses and Aaron by night and said, "Up, go out from among my people, both you and the people of Israel; and go, serve the LORD, as you have said.

<sup>32</sup> Take your flocks and your herds, as you have said, and be gone, and bless me also!"



Comprehensive – "all the firstborn" A Great Cry – like no other time in human history Commanded to Leave – Go...Serve the Lord A Strange Request – "Bless Me Also!"





## The Exodus: Plundering of Egypt

<sup>33</sup> The Egyptians were urgent with the people to send them out of the land in haste. For they said, "We shall all be dead."

- <sup>34</sup> So the people took their dough before it was leavened, their kneading bowls being bound up in their cloaks on their shoulders.
- <sup>35</sup> The people of Israel had also done as Moses told them, for **they** had asked the Egyptians for silver and gold jewelry and for clothing.

<sup>36</sup> And the LORD had given the people favor in the sight of the Egyptians, so that they let them have what they asked. Thus they plundered the Egyptians.





### The Exodus: Pathway to Freedom

<sup>37</sup> And the people of Israel journeyed from **Rameses** to **Succoth**, about six hundred thousand men on foot, besides women and children.

<sup>38</sup> A mixed multitude also went up with them, and very much livestock, both flocks and herds.

<sup>39</sup> And they baked **unleavened cakes** of the dough that they had brought out of Egypt, for it was not leavened, **because they were thrust out of Egypt and could not wait,** nor had they prepared any provisions for themselves.







## The Prophecy: Genesis 15:12-16 430 years previously...

<sup>12</sup> As the sun was going down, a deep sleep fell on Abram. And behold, dreadful and great darkness fell upon him.

<sup>13</sup> Then the LORD said to Abram, "Know for certain that your offspring will be <u>sojourners</u> in a land that is not theirs and will be <u>servants</u> there, and <u>they will be</u> <u>afflicted for four hundred years.</u>

<sup>14</sup> But I will bring judgment on the nation that they serve, and afterward <u>they shall</u> <u>come out with great possessions.</u>

<sup>15</sup> As for you, you shall go to your fathers in peace; you shall be buried in a good old age.

<sup>16</sup> And they shall come back here in the fourth generation, for the iniquity of the Amorites is not yet complete."





### The Exodus : Prophecy Fulfilled

<sup>40</sup> The time that the people of Israel lived in Egypt was <u>430</u>

#### <u>years</u>.

<sup>41</sup> At the end of **430 years**, <u>on that very day</u>, all the hosts of the LORD went out from the land of Egypt.

<sup>42</sup> It was a night of watching by the LORD, to bring them out of the land of Egypt; so this same night is a night of watching kept to the LORD by all the people of Israel **throughout their generations**.

Questions (1)



- Exodus 12:2 begins with God reforming the Hebrew calendar. What does God decree through Moses? How does this emphasize the significance of the Passover to the people? Why does God want this month and this event to be remembered by his people? (See <u>Exodus 12:14, 34:18; Leviticus 23:5; Numbers 28:16;</u> <u>Deuteronomy 16:1</u>)
- 2. God gives specific instructions about the lamb (vv. 3-6). What was to be done with it (vv. 7-11). What details about the lamb do you notice? What do these instructions tell you? Why could not just any lamb be used for the purpose of redemption? (<u>Deuteronomy 17:1; Malachi 1:7-8, 14; Hebrews 9:13-14; 1 Peter 1:18-19</u>) Is there any significance to the lamb's two-fold purpose being used to mark the home and to also be eaten by the household? (<u>Matthew 26:26; John 6:52-57</u>)
- 3. No home was spared death in Egypt that night: Either the death of a firstborn or the death of a lamb. What was God bringing his judgment against? What needed to be believed, what needed to be done, what needed to be trusted to be saved from the judgment? Explain how everyone who is saved is saved through judgment?
- In <u>1 Corinthians 5:7</u> Paul explicitly calls Jesus "our Passover lamb". How does the Passover lamb relate to Jesus? Note the relationship between Jesus and the Passover lamb in each of these verses: <u>John 1:29, John</u> <u>19:14, Acts 8:32-35, 1 Peter 1:19, Revelation 5:6-9,12</u>.
- 5. Read <u>Matthew 26:17–29</u>. Jesus kept the Passover, but He used the event to inaugurate a new observance, which we call the Lord's Supper. What are the similarities between Passover and Lord's Supper? What are the differences? What does this passage tell us about the continuity between the Old and New Testaments?
- 6. When God delivers his people through judgment (vv. 33-40), He fulfills His promises. What promises did God fulfil? (Exodus 3:21-22; Genesis 15:13) Compare v. 38 with Genesis 12:1-3. What promises do we look to be fulfilled when God moves to deliver us from judgment? (See Isaiah 45:17; Psalm 106:10; 1 Thessalonians 5:9; Romans 8:1; 2 Corinthians 3:18; Ephesians 2:7; 2 Timothy 2:12; Philemon 3:21)

- 7. What title would you give to this lesson and how would you summarize its key points in a few words or phrases?
- 8. Why do you think God might have established this month as the first month of the year on the Hebrew calendar?
- 9. How would you best describe what the Passover is all about and how did it relate with the nine prior plagues imposed on Egypt?
- 10. What factors and details do you see in the Passover that depict the person and work of Christ?
- 11. In what sense was the response of the children of Israel to the detailed instructions given by God through Moses a demonstration of "saving faith"?
- 12. How is the doctrine of propitiation illustrated by what happened on the night of the Passover?

- 13. Why do you think God instructed the children of Israel to memorialize, commemorate, and "replay" all the events and details of the Passover as a permanent ordinance?
- 14. How does the Feast of Unleavened Bread correlate with the Passover observance?
- 15. What roles do worship and obedience play in the redemption process based on what you have learned in this lesson?
- 16. Why do you think God allowed the children of Israel to sojourn so long in the land of Egypt (430 years) on their way to the Promised Land and what does that suggest for Christians today?
- 17. Why do you think Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper years later on the day of the Passover? In what sense did He become the perfect Passover lamb (sacrifice) for all mankind?
- 18. How does our memory verse (<u>1 Peter 1:18-19</u>) tie into this passage?
- 19. What key points will you take with you from this lesson?

It shall be the first month of the year for you. <sup>3</sup> Tell all the congregation of Israel that on the tenth day of this month every man shall take a lamb according to their fathers' houses, a lamb for a household. <sup>4</sup> And if the household is too small for a lamb, then he and his nearest neighbor shall take according to the number of persons; according to what each can eat you shall make your count for the lamb. <sup>5</sup> Your lamb shall be without blemish, a male a year old. You may take it from the sheep or from the goats, <sup>6</sup> and you shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month, when the whole assembly of the congregation of Israel shall kill their lambs at twilight.





<sup>7</sup> "Then they shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. <sup>8</sup> They shall eat the flesh that night, roasted on the fire; with unleavened bread and bitter herbs they shall eat it. <sup>9</sup> Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted, its head with its legs and its inner parts. <sup>10</sup> And you shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. <sup>11</sup> In this manner you shall eat it: with your belt fastened, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand. And you shall eat it in haste. It is the LORD's Passover. <sup>12</sup> For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike all the firstborn in the land of Egypt, both man and beast; and on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. <sup>13</sup> The blood shall be a sign for you, on the houses where you are. And when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague will befall you to destroy you, when I strike the land of Egypt.





<sup>14</sup> "This day shall be for you a memorial day, and you shall keep it as a feast to the LORD; throughout your generations, as a statute forever, you shall keep it as a feast. <sup>15</sup> Seven days you shall eat unleavened bread. On the first day you shall remove leaven out of your houses, for if anyone eats what is leavened, from the first day until the seventh day, that person shall be cut off from Israel. <sup>16</sup> On the first day you shall hold a holy assembly, and on the seventh day a holy assembly. No work shall be done on those days. But what everyone needs to eat, that alone may be prepared by you. <sup>17</sup> And you shall observe the Feast of Unleavened Bread, for on this very day I brought your hosts out of the land of Egypt. Therefore you shall observe this day, throughout your generations, as a statute forever. <sup>18</sup> In the first month, from the fourteenth day of the month at evening, you shall eat unleavened bread until the twenty-first day of the month at evening. <sup>19</sup> For seven days no leaven is to be found in your houses. If anyone eats what is leavened, that person will be cut off from the congregation of Israel, whether he is a sojourner or a native of the land. <sup>20</sup> You shall eat nothing leavened; in all your dwelling places you shall eat unleavened bread."





<sup>21</sup>Then Moses called all the elders of Israel and said to them, "Go and select lambs for yourselves according to your clans, and kill the Passover lamb. <sup>22</sup> Take a bunch of hyssop and dip it in the blood that is in the basin, and touch the lintel and the two doorposts with the blood that is in the basin. None of you shall go out of the door of his house until the morning. <sup>23</sup> For the LORD will pass through to strike the Egyptians, and when he sees the blood on the lintel and on the two doorposts, the LORD will pass over the door and will not allow the destroyer to enter your houses to strike you. <sup>24</sup> You shall observe this rite as a statute for you and for your sons forever. <sup>25</sup> And when you come to the land that the LORD will give you, as he has promised, you shall keep this service. <sup>26</sup> And when your children say to you, 'What do you mean by this service?' <sup>27</sup> you shall say, 'It is the sacrifice of the LORD's Passover, for he passed over the houses of the people of Israel in Egypt, when he struck the Egyptians but spared our houses." And the people bowed their heads and worshiped. <sup>28</sup> Then the people of Israel went and did so; as the LORD had commanded Moses and Aaron, so they did.





<sup>29</sup> At midnight the LORD struck down all the firstborn in the land of Egypt, from the firstborn of Pharaoh who sat on his throne to the firstborn of the captive who was in the dungeon, and all the firstborn of the livestock. <sup>30</sup> And Pharaoh rose up in the night, he and all his servants and all the Egyptians. And there was a great cry in Egypt, for there was not a house where someone was not dead. <sup>31</sup> Then he summoned Moses and Aaron by night and said, "Up, go out from among my people, both you and the people of Israel; and go, serve the LORD, as you have said. <sup>32</sup> Take your flocks and your herds, as you have said, and be gone, and bless me also!"





<sup>33</sup> The Egyptians were urgent with the people to send them out of the land in haste. For they said, "We shall all be dead." <sup>34</sup> So the people took their dough before it was leavened, their kneading bowls being bound up in their cloaks on their shoulders. <sup>35</sup> The people of Israel had also done as Moses told them, for they had asked the Egyptians for silver and gold jewelry and for clothing. <sup>36</sup> And the LORD had given the people favor in the sight of the Egyptians, so that they let them have what they asked. Thus they plundered the Egyptians.


<sup>37</sup> And the people of Israel journeyed from Rameses to Succoth, about six hundred thousand men on foot, besides women and children. <sup>38</sup> A mixed multitude also went up with them, and very much livestock, both flocks and herds. <sup>39</sup> And they baked unleavened cakes of the dough that they had brought out of Egypt, for it was not leavened, because they were thrust out of Egypt and could not wait, nor had they prepared any provisions for themselves.

<sup>40</sup> The time that the people of Israel lived in Egypt was 430 years. <sup>41</sup> At the end of 430 years, on that very day, all the hosts of the LORD went out from the land of Egypt. <sup>42</sup> It was a night of watching by the LORD, to bring them out of the land of Egypt; so this same night is a night of watching kept to the LORD by all the people of Israel throughout their generations.






